The President's Message

On Accuracy

Here's a topic I've always felt worthy of a few sentences. Basically for me, accuracy in wood-working involves being able to put a sharp point on a pencil, draw a straight line, and having a full and complete understanding of what square means and what square is.

The concept of square shouldn't be taken lightly, if you are doing fine work. It's really worth while to get good tools such as those made by Starrett, Bridge City and Lee Valley (Veritas) for example. When checking cuts for squareness, hold the work up to a bright light and see if any light comes through between the blade of the square and your cut. If it's dark, then you are square.

Keep checking machine setups and the resulting cuts, because being a little off can translate into being a lot off quite easily.

All the accurate squares, English rulers with hairline calibrations, or talk of thousandths of an inch, don't mean a thing if you can't put a sharp point on a pencil.

I've gone to mechanical drafting pencils with 3H lead for most of my layout work, although, sometimes, I use a mat knife for marking. Now all I need is a fresh pair of glasses (the kind that are not loaded with scratches) and good lighting.

Sharp cutting tools of course are essential for accurate work, and I can still hear Bill Thomas, at an early Guild meeting, stressing the importance of having a "Flat

Back" on the blade of a chisel or plane... shiny does not mean sharp.

Now on to other things.

I want to thank Dave Emerson for all his work as the primary organizer of Wood Days at Canterbury Shaker Village and Wood Week at the League of NH Craftsmen's Fair this summer. In addition, my thanks to all those who helped as demonstrators and on other tasks at both events.

The Clear Pine Cupboard we built at Canterbury and at my shop in Warner raised a significant money for the guild scholarship fund raffle. Congratulations to Doris Boeddinghaus of Hampton NH who won the cupboard.

The Steering committee met in August to chart the Guild's future activities after the meeting on Inlay at Garrett Hack's shop October 2nd and the Musical Instrument meeting in November. It was unanimously decided to start the new century off with a multi-presenter meeting on the design process as a sequel to our design symposium of a few years ago. The date is set for Feb, 19, 2000!

Inlays with Garrett Hack and Annual Meeting – October 2, 1999

The first fall meeting including, our Annual Meeting and Election of Officers, will be at Garrett Hack's shop in Thetford, VT on Saturday, October 2nd.

Note the change in date.

Garrett has a very busy September schedule, and after discussing his schedule and that of the Guild, we decided that an early October meeting might be best for all parties.

Many of you will remember the very interesting meeting that we held there two years ago. Garrett's topic this year is Inlay.

Garrett writes:

Sometime after my Shaker phase, I discovered inlay. An image that sticks in my memory is a Federal side table illuminated by dim candlelight, the fine white string inlay running up the legs and around the aprons reflected the light and outlined the form in a striking way.

The more I looked at Federal furniture and even styles as far back as Egyptian work three millennia old, the more intrigued I became with what can be done with a few small pieces of contrasting wood set into the surface. The patterns and flourishes attract and delight my eye in a playful and most enjoyable way.

Making inlays was a specialized trade in the 18th century, much like upholstery and carving. Considering how commonly inlay was used in furniture making centers such as Portsmouth, NH and Baltimore, MD, I've discovered that very little has been written about the techniques and tricks of making and using it.

Only through careful inspection of old work and much trial and error have I learned the basic techniques of string inlay and making and inlaying patterns. With these techniques alone, the possibilities are still endless, depending only upon your creativity and patience.

I've had to make some interesting tools along the way, all of which I will demonstrate in cutting some inlays on Saturday, October, 2nd.

Garrett's Biography

Garret Hack operates a one-man shop in Thetford Center, VT, where he builds contemporary designs based on traditional furniture forms. He was originally trained as an architect. He later studied furniture design and construction with Jere Osgood at Boston University's Program in Artisanry and turned to full time furniture making over two decades ago. He writes regularly for *Fine Woodworking* magazine about craftsmanship and woodworking techniques.

A special interest in woodworking hand tools led to his writing *The Handplane Book* for Taunton Press. This has been followed by a brand new Taunton Press book *Classic Hand Tools*. Garrett hopes to have some signed copies for purchase at the meeting.

Directions to Garrett Hack's Shop

Thetford Center is just north and west of Hanover, NH and Norwich, VT. From central NH

- I-89 to White River Junction and I-91.
- I-91 north to Exit 13, (Hanover, Norwich exit).
- Left at the end of the ramp, 1/2 mi. on Main St. into Norwich.
- Past *Dan and Wu's General Store* and straight through town. This becomes Union Village Road and eventually Rt. 132.
- Straight ahead at the Yield sign, (about four miles) and at another fork a mile beyond. Don't fork right!
- Nine miles out, just after the concrete bridge, look for a paved road Tucker Hill Road) coming in on the right. Stay on Rt. 132!
- Jackson Brook Road (dirt) comes in on the right, just past another small dirt road and a group of mail boxes.
- Right on Jackson Brook Road about 1/4 mile to shop (dead end).
- Park along the dirt road at the height of land, where it widens into a large turn-around and walk down to the shop.

Report on the Queen Anne Chair Project

66th League of New Hampshire Craftsmen Fair — Mount Sunapee State Park: August 10, 11, 12, 13, 1999

Forty-one members contributed to the Design and Construction of a set of nine, Boston/Rhode Island Queen Anne Chairs, Circa 1740. Our goal was to educate our membership and the public on the complexities of the chair project through meetings, demonstrations, newsletters, and member participation.

The Queen Anne Chair Project was spread over an entire year, beginning in September 1998 and ending with the Fair in August 1999.

The project can be broken down into five phases:

- **Planning**
- **Process**
- **Product**
- **People**
- **Places**
- **Promotion**

Planning began at Loran Smith's BIG Workshop on 9/12/98. Loran's presentation covered *Line Drawings*, an essential step in most projects.

Process

We attempted to make note of all the steps in the process necessary to efficiently complete a successful project on time.

- **Concept** (Think, Research, Create)
- **Sketch**
- **Full scale drawings**
- **Joinery layout**
- **Templates**
- **Material choices**
- **Cut lists**
- **Mill up** (joint, plane, square up stock, cut to size etc.)
- **Jigs, fixtures, and machining operations**
- **Handwork**, spokeshaves, rasps, files, and scrapers

- **Dry assembly**, joint tweaking, assembly, finishing

- **Fabric and Upholstery**

Product

One chair was completed prior to the Fair. The other eight chairs were left in various stages to show the progression and to have specific tasks to demonstrate at the Fair.

People

Eric Feldborg helped with joinery at **WOOD DAYS**, and assisted with setup, joinery, and finishing at the Fair.

Jack Grube, **Pinkerton Academy**, and the **Pinkerton Shop Students** for providing much of the Mahogany, Millwork Blanks, and Demonstration Space. Jack has been an inspiration during the year.

Jon Gunterman for his great workshop on *Making Spokeshaves*, the same spokeshaves used to make the chairs.

Bill Hart, true to his word, made the trip to Sunapee every day, to keep us sane, and our edges SHARP. We all can learn a little about sharpening if we pay attention to Bill Hart. Thank you, Bill.

Howard Hatch for his *Workshop on Jigs and Fixtures* and helpful suggestions regarding the compound joints of the lower back stretchers.

David Lamb provided consultation throughout the project and demonstrated hand carving and shaping of Cabriole Legs with the Spokeshave, Patternmaker's Rasp, Files and Scraper. David's presence provided professionalism.

Bob Martel for giving up several Saturdays for our use of the Wood Shop at the Hillside School and bringing out the troops for the BIG Demonstrations.

Tom McLaughlin provided his **Conover** lathe and **Jon Siegel** turned the simple and complex spindles for the undercar-

riage of the chair. Jon also provided much needed support during and after the April BIG workshop on *Making Cabriole Legs*. **Terry Moore** instructed on *How to Tune a Scraper* during his workshop in February, and demonstrated dovetailing at the Fair on Thursday.

Jere Osgood and Terry Moore for their articles on Bearing Guided Shaper operations with templates.

Loran Smith provided the bookend to the project by making the lap jointed slip seats for some of the chairs.

Timber Framing With Ted Benson

On June 12th, about two dozen Guild members made the field trip to Ted Benson's for a tour of his timber framing operation.

In his relaxed and informal style, Ted had us sitting on benches made from sawhorses and large timbers which were being processed in the shop. Ted explained how he views timber frame joinery as an enlarged version of making joints for cabinetry and furniture, and how they work to a tolerance of 1/32 of an inch.

We had about an hour and a half slide show and running commentary about both homes and commercial projects he has done over the last few years.

He sketched the history of his operation from a small startup where he learned by research, field trips, and by doing. He is now at the level where he takes on large commercial projects, has a full time structural engineer with support staff, and works internationally.

The plant tour began in the bay where timbers are mortised and tenoned with 14" circular saws and 1" hollow mortising chisels. In this area, each of the bents (sectional frames) was of a different type wood cut to the same dimensions and fitted with strain gages for research.

The bents were made, in turn, from red oak, Port Orford cedar, southern longleaf pine, native white pine, and Douglas fir. Much of the wood we saw was recovered from demo-

lition projects, including a beautiful set of 8" x 12" x 70 foot Douglas fir beams recovered from the worlds largest sawmill in Oregon.

While machines do much of the simpler work, more complicated joints, such as compound miters and joints at hips and valleys, require a skilled craftsman and can't be duplicated by machine.

A walk down the hill to his back building revealed one of his newest projects, stress skin panels made in-house and filled with the insulating foam after all the carpentry was done. Ted explained and showed us one, half-full, 5 gallon pail contained all of the waste foam from about a dozen panels.

In line with his environmental ethic, he talked about how a timber frame home uses far less lumber than a conventional stick framed house. Apparently, the Europeans still build almost entirely with timber framing techniques, a result of the relatively higher value of lumber and lack of space upon which to grow it.

Other panel research is ongoing, including an attempt to develop a flexible system for installing plumbing and wiring into the panels with provisions for future growth or replacement to reflect the changing needs of technological.

The final stop at the Alstead facility was the woodworking shop. Well equipped, but con-

ventional.

Next, we drove down to Keene to see his 1/2 million dollar, German, computerized mortise and tenoning machine, but luck wasn't with us. Ted forgot his keys and we had to be content with viewing it through the windows.

While it is only one of 3 such machines in the U.S., there are over 900 in use in Europe. Ted explained how the machine not only hasn't decreased his employment, it has freed his men to work on the many more complicated joints.

Capacity has also been increased to the point where he can now take on about 50 projects per year. The net result has been increased staffing because of the added capability and more interesting work for everyone.

Next year, both Alstead and Keene will be closed and all operations will go under one roof in Walpole.

It appears that Ted is having fun and has off-loaded many of the supervisory chores to his employees by making each one in turn a supervisor and job captain. This has lightened the administrative load on him and has provided increased income and job satisfaction for his staff.

The good time we had during the day was in many ways a reflection of Ted's contagious enthusiasm. If you get the chance, his slide show is not to be missed.

Guild Members In the News

Three members of the Guild were recently in Washington DC representing New Hampshire in the Smithsonian Folklife Festival. **David Lamb**, a founding Guild member, **Jon Siegel**, a former Guild president, and **Omar Clairmont**, a master Windsor chair maker, traveled to DC for the two week, NH State Exhibition on the Mall. This is located in front of the Smithsonian Museum, right between the Capitol and the Washington Monument.

These craftsmen were chosen to represent the three hundred year tradition of fine furniture making in the State of New Hampshire. All three woodworkers are also members of the New Hampshire Furniture Masters Association, and David is a member of

the League of NH Craftsmen.

The participation of New Hampshire in the 33 year old festival has been in the planning for three years. Over 500 people were interviewed by the Smithsonian and over 100 were selected to take part. The NH exhibit filled an area equal to three football fields and occupied over one dozen tents.

Some of the things trucked down for the exhibit included: a covered bridge, a timber frame barn, (complete with horses and oxen), a sugar house, and 13 tons of granite! As usual NH shared the festival stage with two foreign countries, and this year it was South Africa and Romania.

If you were not able to see the exhibit in DC,

don't worry. The entire show (NH part) will be recreated next summer at the Hopkinton fairgrounds.

Jon Siegel is now the New England correspondent for the English woodturning magazine *Woodturning*. The last issue featured an article on Earle Rich's vacuum/microwave drying system for turnings, and the talk that he gave at the Guild of NH Woodworkers Wood Symposium at Pinkerton Academy. Hey, we are internationally known!

Alan Mitchell has added **Geoff Ames** to the staff at Homestead Woodworking School. They hope to develop a Period Furniture Program starting October 28th.

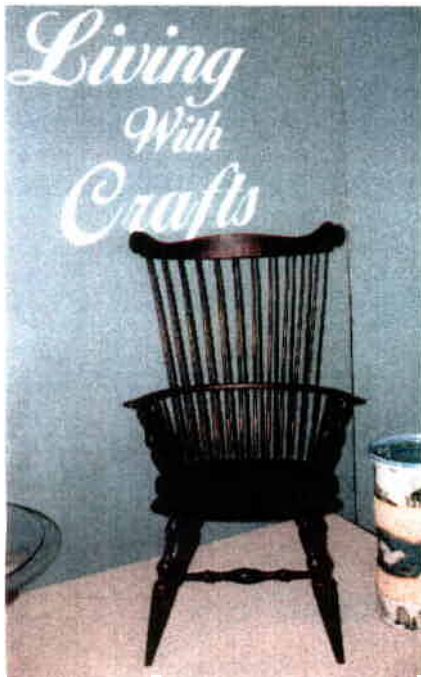

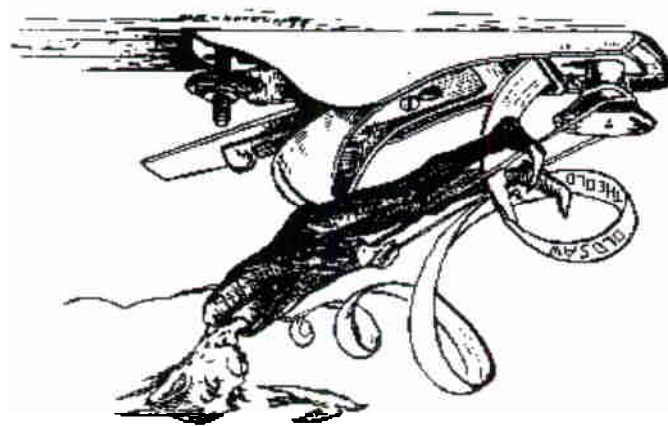
